Today, Waikiki is a vibrant gathering place for visitors from around the world. Along the main strip of Kalakaua Avenue you'll find world-class shopping, dining, entertainment, and hospitality.

At legendary Waikiki Beach, a statue of Hawaiian hero Duke Kahanamoku welcomes you with open arms. Regarded as the “Father of modern surfing,” Duke grew up and surfed in Waikiki during the turn of the century. Discovered as a swimming sensation, the prodigious Duke won Olympic gold medals in the 100-meter freestyle in 1912 and 1920. The amiable Duke later went on to act in Hollywood and used his fame to spread the popularity of surfing and the spirit of aloha around the world.

From Hawaiian royalty to Hawaiian Regional Cuisine, Waikiki continues to be an evolving expression of the ancient spirit of aloha. On these famous shores, the past and the future are uniting in fresh and surprising ways.

LUAU

A luau is a traditional Hawaiian feast and no first trip to Hawaii is complete

without attending one. Most luaus in Hawaii are catered towards visitors, so expect a grand celebration of food, entertainment, and learning about Hawaiian and Polynesian culture.

Bring your appetite since you'll be feasting on a magnificent Hawaiian spread of kalua pig (pork cooked in a traditional pit oven), lau lau (beef, pork, chicken, or fish steamed in ti leaves), and poi (Polynesian staple starch made of taro).

Listen to traditional and contemporary Hawaiian music and chants. Watch hula dancers tell beautiful stories of Hawaiiana with their elegant and graceful movements. Many luaus also highlight greater Polynesia by featuring Samoan fire dancers and mesmerizing Tahitian dancers. If you've got the courage, you may even get the chance to dance the hula in front of your entire luau.



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Board Office Open Positions

The nominations deadline is November 15, 2008

CCME is accepting nominations for officers to serve on our executive board for the next two years. You may nominate yourself or someone else. We are looking for enthusiastic and dedicated individuals with a variety of skills who are able to commit two years to help plan up-coming symposia and to tackle issues involving military education. The offices with their duties and requirements are below:

PRESIDENT-ELECT

- Must have served a minimum of two years as either an elected or appointed member of the board.
- Must be available to assume CCME leadership in the absence of the President.
- Must be willing to assume responsibility of preparing the program for the up-coming 2010 symposium.
- Must be available to serve as President the year after serving as President-Elect, conducting all board meetings and the general symposium for 2011.
- Serves in any other capacity requested by the President.

VICE-PRESIDENT (Military):

- Must have attended at least two CCME symposia within the past three years.
- Must currently work in military voluntary education.
- Serves as the liaison between CCME and the service chiefs for voluntary education issues on behalf of CCME
- Performs duties of the President-Elect in the absence of the President-Elect when the office is held by a military representative
- Performs the duties of planning and coordination of CCME Conference Agenda Planning with the VP of Institutions to prepare a draft outline of conference agenda items
- Acts as liaison to ACE, SOC, and DANTEs with the VP for Institutions as it relates to current military educational issues.

SECRETARY-ELECT:

- Takes minutes of the Board meetings.
- Prepares and sends them to the Board members.
- Assumes Secretarial duties the second year, publicizing quarterly newsletters
- Serves in any other capacity requested by the President

We encourage you to run and/or nominate someone for these positions. If you self-nominate, please include a picture and a brief bio with your nomination. If you are nominated by someone else, you will be notified and asked if you wish to accept the nomination. If you accept, you will need to provide a picture and a brief bio for the symposium program.
