In Memoriam Dr. Paul E. Huff



Dr. Paul E. Huff passed away on November 5, 2010. Dr. Huff served more than 30 years with the Department of Defense prior to serving as the Chief of the Education Division, Headquarters Strategic Air Command. In the 15 years Dr. Huff spent with SAC, he completely revolutionized the face of SAC's education programs. A true pioneer and visionary, Dr. Huff increased the limited education offerings and services into multifaceted and diverse on-base, degree granting programs. He also initiated the Minuteman Education Program to encourage officers to volunteer for Launch Control duty. This program resulted in more than 3,500 graduate degrees for Air Force Officers. In 1990, Dr. Huff received the Lifetime Humanitarian Award from the American Association of College Counselors. After retiring from federal service, Dr. Huff served as a faculty member for several colleges and universities. In 1996, he was elected as the community representative for the School Based Management Council for He'eia Elementary School in Kaneohe, Hawaii. Dr. Huff's tremendous efforts and accomplishments are truly admirable. He was extremely passionate about his work and he will be greatly missed. He is survived by his wife Ms. Loretta Cornett-Huff, who will without a doubt perpetuate his passion for military education.

Moving On John "JJ" Jones Retires Again!

This year, John F. ("JJ") Jones, Jr. retired from his position as the vice president for Department of Defense Relations at the University of Maryland University College (UMUC). He has been with UMUC since August 1998. Prior to UMUC, JJ served 26 years in the Air Force retiring with the rank of colonel. His early assignments included



commanding a Minuteman III operational missile crew. He spent much of his career in the education and training field. His assignments included instructor duties at the Air Force's leadership school for company grade officers, Squadron Officer School; program manager and executive officer at the Air Force Institute of Technology; and education program manager at Headquarters Air Force. His final assignment was in the Pentagon as the director of the Education and Training Division at Headquarters Air Force. He earned a bachelor's degree (BS) in biology at the Ohio State University and a master's degree (MA) in history from the University of Alabama. He is also a graduate of the Air Command and Staff College and the National War College. JJ has held numerous board positions within CCME most recently as Historian. Though retired, JJ plans to still teach for UMUC.

YOU OUGHT TO BE IN PICTURES!

From <u>your</u> perspective, what are the KEY ISSUES/CHALLENGES FACING THE VOLUNTARY EDUCATION COMMUNITY? Instead of surveying educators about what they perceive as priority issues and reporting out those findings, I want to capture those comments as video or audio recordings. In your own words, what issues are impacting your services, programming, and operations for military students; what challenges are looming on the horizon that may potentially influence or change voluntary education? I'm seeking the broadest collection of input from the field—education services officers/specialists, counselors, college administrators, institutional leaders, government careerists—so PLEASE consider participating. I need everyone's help in preparing for a presentation focused on Key Issues in Voluntary Education at this year's CCME Annual Symposium.

The Production staff from Dallas TeleCollege's LeCroy Center has generously agreed to weave the collection of video and audio recordings into a collage that will be shared at one of CCME's general sessions this February. They, in collaboration with SOC, will do the hard part—editing, pasting, and synthesizing the responses. Most likely we will be using sound and video bites, not the recording in its entirety.

What's your role? The assignment is simple: give thought to the series of questions below, compose your response to any (or all) of the questions below, secure a video camera or audio recorder (video camcorder, handheld video camera) press the RECORD button, and document your responses. If you prefer to be heard (but not seen), then you may only want to provide an audio recording; perhaps accompanied by a photo of yourself or a picture that depicts voluntary education activities at your institution/installation. We will also accept written responses that will be presented in the collage as quotes. The primary goal of this activity to document and collect personal responses to the questions, not focus on the visual aesthetics. So I hope you will shake off concerns about image and focus on the message you wish to share with other educators. It's your chance to be heard!

Please respond to the any/all of the following question(s) for the SOC video collage on Key Issues/Challenges Facing the Voluntary Education Community:

- The greatest issue/challenge facing military education today is...
- What Voluntary Education challenge/issue keeps you up at night?
- The military/veteran program or initiative at my institution that I am most proud of is: (Do you have photos to showcase activities, programs that demonstrate your institutional efforts to engage and serve military students? We can also fold those into our video collage).
- If I had five minutes alone with DoD leadership, the key point I would make about education programs for Service members would be:

SOC'S BURNING ISSUES SUMMIT: TRACKING MILITARY STUDENTS: EFFECTIVE STUDENT SUCCESS AND OUTCOME MEASURES

Servicemembers Opportunity Colleges (SOC) invites college and military educators and leadership to participate in a pre-conference event on Monday, February 14, 1:30-3:30. Please check the CCME conference registration area for the assigned meeting room in the Tampa Bay Convention Center.

The increased discussions on program accountability across the spectrum of higher education have called attention to the need for consistent, relevant, and meaningful definitions and measures of student outcomes and student success. This is no less true for the military student population who use military Tuition Assistance to support their education.

Last year's Burning Issues Summit generated considerable discussion on the diversity of practices, policies, and metrics that colleges employ to assess persistence, retention and degree completion. The Summit concluded with a number of recommendations and proposed actions to further identify and advance common metrics and success indicators for military student populations. A key recommendation was that SOC provide leadership to bring together a working group of key stakeholders in the voluntary education community.

The SOC Burning Issues Summit this year will build on the recommendations of last year's CCME preconference event. In preparation for this Burning Issues Summit, SOC has convened a working group of higher education and military education strategic thinkers and data analysts to begin the work of identifying a common set of definitions of persistence (progress to degree completion) and retention and propose a common set of metrics that will allow for comparisons across the voluntary education community. Preliminary findings will be presented and promising institutional practices for supporting student success and effective measures to track the military student population will be highlighted. The participation of CCME members will be key in identifying core issues and providing guidance and input on steps that can move us forward.

Advisory Councils on Military Education: Yes You Can!

Since Ed Kringer, Director, State Liaison and Education Opportunities, Department of Defense, made his presentation at CCME's last conference in Nashville, there have been a lot of discussions and a lot of confusion whether government representatives can or should continue participating in the ACMEs, which DoD took a proactive lead in helping establish, or in other national education associations in which they participate.

The short answer is Yes, You Can! You can participate. DoD did not say you couldn't. So if the Services or anyone from your installation state that you can't participate in state ACMEs, they are woefully incorrect. In fact they are doing service members and their families a huge disservice by saying so.

To ensure the professional growth of government education personnel, it had long been my policy, as the then Director of DoD Educational Opportunities, and before that as Chief of DoD Voluntary Education, to consistently encourage proactive interaction with partner institutions in professional venues provided by the ACMEs, CCME, AAACE and the like. To do otherwise would limit the level of understanding and knowledge of a government workforce that needs to be able to stand toe to toe with their counterparts in academe, so that they can work with them toward a common, informed goal to support our service members with the best staff and programs possible.

Returning now to the CCME conference at Nashville, realizing that each Service could easily interpret the information that he shared with participants at the Nashville CCME conference differently, Ed Kringer, DoD Director, State Liaison and Education Opportunities, made a commitment to generate a letter of clarification to DoD education policy that would provide, under signature of the Deputy Under Secretary of Defense, Military Community and Family Policy, definitive guidance allowing and encouraging continued government employees participation in ACMEs and other similar organizations. This letter is forthcoming.

To see how all of this unfolds, join CCME at its upcoming national conference in February 2011, in Tampa, Florida. A concurrent session is scheduled at the symposium that will continue this discussion about government participation in state and national education organizations. The intent of the panel is to determine ways government personnel can participate, so they can advantageously and most effectively continue contributing to the educational best interests of the military community within the context of state, regional and national organizations established to do just that.

See you in Tampa!

Gary A. Woods is the Vice Chancellor of Brandman University and President-Elect of NAIMES. Until February 2010, Gary served as the Director of Educational Opportunities at the Department of Defense. In that capacity, he participated in discussions with DoD legal counsel that determined the parameters within which government personnel could continue participation in meetings and functions of state ACMEs and national education organizations.
